**Total Credits**

The Associate of Applied Science Degree in Police Science requires 66 credit hours. Of those credits, 63 will transfer to Radford University as long as the following Program Notes are followed (ADJ288 does not have a transfer equivalent and is not accepted by Radford University). Students completing one of the listed three credit Health/PE courses that transfer rather than two of the one credit PE courses will transfer in 64 credits.<sup>6</sup>

<sup>2</sup> Students are strongly encouraged to take ADJ100 at New River Community College prior to transferring since the transfer equivalent (CRJU100) is a prerequisite for all 300/400 level CRJU courses at Radford University.

<sup>3</sup> Students interested in earning a Bachelor of Arts degree will need to take 6-8 credits of foreign language and will not be required to take an additional Bachelor of Science related course.

<sup>4</sup> The Department of Criminal Justice offers minors in Conservation Law Enforcement, Crime Analysis and Forensic Studies, but students often earn minors from other departments, such as psychology or sociology.
